

I'm excited about the first topic of the year, E-Waste, and hope that you are looking forward to diving in with your students as the year starts. The practice problem requires the first three steps only: the challenges, the underlying problem and the solutions. Completing this practice problem helps your students by reviewing just the first three steps or by learning a small portion of the entire process.

For those of you who are interested in coaching Community Problem Solving, FPSPI has created a course of virtual lessons that show you (or your students) how to develop the skills necessary to complete a successful CmPS project. 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CHANGES FOR 2022-23

This year there will be two major changes.

CmPS: Both Community Problem Solving teams and individuals will compete against one another, so there will not be separate team and individual competitions.

Scenario Writing: There will not be an intermediate step in Scenario Writing between the Qualifying State scenario write (due in January) and the International Competition in June. In the past, winning scenarios have been entered into the ISWC and winners of that competition have been announced in April. This year, there will be no International competition in March; however, Washington state will be allotted a certain number of International Conference slots and those slots will be filled by our State scenario winners. Those students will then be invited to IC and will compete there.

FSPI has created 10 lessons, including 10 quizzes, in an Introduction to Community Problem Solving Projects online learning course for students and/or coaches.

Students completing the course will:

1. Understand and be able to implement the Creative Problem Solving process
2. Develop their writing skills
3. Gain experience with critical and creative thinking
4. Build the background needed to compete in the Community Problem Solving component of Future Problem Solving

Students will record their work in the CmPS Student Notebook which includes embedded activities in each module.

NEW ZOOM MEETINGS FOR COACHES



This year, zoom meetings for coaches will be held after each practice problem. These meetings are designed to strengthen best practices for coaches by allowing coaches a chance to ask questions, discuss, and learn from each write.

The year will start with a “kick-off” session on Oct. 5 at 7 p.m. Normally, these zoom meetings will be *after* each write. This first meeting will be before the first practice problem is due on Oct. 20. So, bring your questions, and we’ll see you on Oct. 5!
